However, when regarded in its historical context, two questions arise: Firstly, what underlying gender concept encouraged Fuller to make such a statement, in 'a time of excessive gender polarization' (Bomarito (vol2) 1), a time in which the ideal of domesticity and Republican Motherhood (Freedman 25) determined the role of woman And secondly, how did antebellum American society react to such statements The first question will be the main issue of part III, the main part of my work. I will begin with Fuller's general gender concept that involves ideas of androgyny and the 'degendering' (Davis 182) of language. Next, the major influences on her...
